November 12 & 13, 2010 – Page, Arizona**

Nearly 25 years ago, the Bureau of Land Management and the Kaibab National Forest sponsored the preparation of *Man, Models and Management: An Overview of the Archaeology of the Arizona Strip and the Management of Its Cultural Resources*. This past November, the Kaibab-Vermilion Cliffs Heritage Alliance sponsored a symposium on the archaeology of the Arizona Strip to address the following questions - Where does the state of archaeological research now stand on the Arizona Strip and adjacent areas of Utah and Nevada? What has the archaeological community learned over the past 25 years? What new research directions are we poised to pursue in the future? Nearly 150 professional, student, and avocational archaeologists gathered in Page to hear and view 44 papers and posters covering a wide range of topics – including ceramics, flaked stone, rock art, paleobotany, fauna, agricultural strategies, mortuary practices, historic sites, cultural resource management, and the history of research in the region (see list of papers and posters on the back).
