OUR ROLE



Land

The Colorado Plateau is home to the greatest concentration of national parks, monuments, wilderness areas, and undeveloped land in the continental United States.

Through public advocacy and collaborative partnerships, we use innovative science as the bedrock for better on-the-ground management of these special places.



Energy

The Colorado Plateau is rich in coal, uranium, oil shale, and tar sands, but the continued development of these energy sources is dangerous, irresponsible, and short-sighted, especially in a region rich with sustainable energy potential. Our energy program seeks to reduce and clean up fossil fuel and uranium legacies, and encourages a transition toward harnessing our ample solar and wind resources.



Native America

Tribal lands of 15 Nations comprise one third of the Colorado Plateau. Tribal communities face political barriers to building resilient local economies as well as a history of socioeconomic challenges. Our Native America program focuses on bringing tribal leaders together to restore traditions and create local, sustainable solutions for communities.



Water

Colorado Plateau water is a scarce resource and is predicted to become even more so with future climate change. With a cavalcade of competing interests including agriculture, energy development, and municipal use, the Trust works to ensure that each drop is put to its highest use and that some still remains in nature. Water conservation lies at the heart of all of our work.
